The Need to Increase Educational Attainment in Maine

The future success of Maine’s businesses and workers is tied to education levels in Maine. Maine workers need education and training to get and keep good jobs, and Maine employers need skilled workers to remain competitive in the global economy.

In 2007, slightly more than one-third of Maine people over the age of 25 held a college degree. If recent employment trends continue, over 43% of the jobs created between 2006 and 2016 will require a post secondary education. Of the 40 occupations with the fastest projected growth rate, over half require a post secondary education.

Maine workforce development initiatives are creating greater opportunities for Maine workers and businesses by supporting adults as they start or continue education and training programs.

This guide highlights a few of the many programs available to Maine workers seeking to improve their skills. It provides a description of each initiative and contact information for follow-up on program details. Many of the websites for the workforce development resources have links to other resources that are available.

Part I: Getting Started

Adult Education

Adult education programs provide a variety of services to ensure adult workers are prepared when they enter post secondary training. Adult education classes throughout the state also provide low cost training on specific job skills such as computer skills, basic math and writing.

Who is eligible: Adults who need a high school diploma; specific skills training; or preparation for college classes, entering certificate and trade programs, or employment.

How it works: Maine Adult Education programs provide career and educational counseling, academic skills courses, GED and high school completion, college prep workshops, computer basics, and prerequisite courses such as algebra and lab sciences. Maine Adult Education programs collaborate with the Maine Department of Labor's CareerCenters on WorkReady™, a course focused on "soft skills" for employment and including computer basics.

College for ME Androscoggin

The College for ME-Androscoggin website (www.collegeformeandroscoggin.org) website is a comprehensive career and college planning resource intended primarily for the use of those who live or work in Androscoggin but it is available to all.

The website is divided into three separate sections called virtual aspirations labs: Teens, Adults, and Employers. The Teen and Adult labs provide comprehensive information to guide the user through a career search, college search, college application and financial aid application. Information is available on obtaining transfer or prior learning credits, specific resources for veterans and their families and resources such as adult education and College Transition programs. The Employer lab provides best practices for employers who want to support their employees' desire to continue their education in order to secure college degrees. A key component to the Employers' section is the Employer Honor Roll which lists those businesses

that have committed to following certain policies or procedures to support the continued education of their work force.

Everyone, teens, adults and employers, will find what they need there to move forward toward completing a college degree. And, once they have attained their degree, they can join many others in the region who register their accomplishment on a unique Degree Monument that lists those with college degrees who live or work in Androscoggin County.

Maine CareerCenters

Maine CareerCenters, a division of the Maine Department of Labor, provides career and training resources online and in centers throughout the state to Maine's employees and employers. The centers help eligible workers develop career and education plans and link them to programs to help them reach their goals.

Who is eligible: Any Maine resident.

How it works: CareerCenters assess skills, abilities and interests of jobseekers to help them develop education and career goals that build on their strengths and experience. Jobseekers are also provided with information and access to programs and services to help them pay for a post secondary education.

Maine Centers for Women Work and Community

Maine Centers for Women Work and Community (WWC) is administered by the University of Maine at Augusta with services provided through 10 centers and 8 outreach sites across the state. The mission of the organization is to improve the economic lives of women and other individuals in transition by increasing their income, assets, and earning potential through increased access to and success in post secondary education, employment and small business.

Who is eligible: Adults in transition.

How it works:

WWC offers individual and group training including career exploration, financial literacy and small business start up counseling. Their core workforce development training program, Creating Your Future, helps individuals make informed career and financial decisions. The curriculum integrates career and educational advising with financial literacy and asset development skills components and stresses the importance of postsecondary education. An individualized Lifelong Learning Plan is created for each participant. WWC also provides the advising component of the LiLA Program and offers Family Development Accounts through all of their centers.

Maine College Transitions

Maine College Transitions helps adults who are currently working on their high school diploma transition to college. The program also provides support to adults who have a high school degree but are not academically prepared to take college courses. The program offers a range of counseling, mentoring and support services at many sites throughout the state. Maine Educational Opportunity Center

The Maine Educational Opportunity Center (MEOC) is a federal education initiative established to help people go to college. MEOC is committed to assisting any adult wishing to enter a formal education setting. Focused on increasing the education levels of adults, the majority of MEOC participants represent the first generation in their families to go to college. MEOC advisors coordinate efforts with area schools, colleges, and other service agencies to provide information and assistance in completing college admission and financial aid forms.

Who is eligible: Any adult worker interested in going back to school.

How it works: The program provides information and assistance to students completing college admission and financial aid forms. Advisors also assess academic readiness, provide career counseling, and refer individuals to community resources.

Part 2: Financing Education and Training

Competitive Skills Scholarship

The Competitive Skills Scholarship is a state-sponsored program that provides workers with financial assistance to help them earn a degree or certificate in certain education or training programs.

Who is eligible: Open to low and moderate income adults pursuing a degree or certificate in high-wage in-demand occupations.

How it works: In addition to paying for tuition, the program covers educational supports for workers in training including, child care, transportation, books, supplies, equipment, and remedial and prerequisite training.

Family Development Account

The Family Development Account Program (FDA) is sponsored by a coalition of non-profits to enable low-income families to establish savings accounts that will be used to buy a home, pay for education, or start or expand a small business. Participating families establish a savings account to be used toward their identified goal. These savings will be matched when withdrawn to purchase an approved asset. (The program is administered by the Maine Family Development Account Coalition.)

Who is eligible: Families who are eligible for TANF or the Earned Income Tax Credit usually qualify to open a FDA.

How it Works: Families complete an application, detailing future plans and savings goals. The family completes money management training and asset specific training. Once the account is opened, the family can then save between \$20 and \$80 per month from earnings for a maximum of \$2,000. The money can be used for education.

Finance Authority of Maine (FAME)

The Finance Authority of Maine (FAME) provides access to a variety of financial solutions to help Maine citizens pursue higher educational opportunities. Products include education investment savings accounts, the Alford College Challenge, links to resources to complete financial aid forms, lists of loan opportunities and scholarships.

Who is eligible: Any Maine resident.

How it works: The program administers a variety of investment, loan, grant and scholarship programs to help pay for higher education and provides outreach and counseling to help young people aspire to and pursue post secondary education.

Lifelong Learning Accounts

Lifelong Learning Accounts (LiLAs) provide an option for employers to help employees save for college.

Who is eligible: Employees at LiLA sponsoring businesses.

How it works: LiLAs are individual investment accounts, matched by the employer, to finance lifelong learning. Funds are invested in a LiLA account. In Maine these are special investment accounts recognized by the IRS that are used for the employee's higher education expenses.

Maine Apprenticeship Program

The Maine Apprenticeship Program allows workers to learn new skills through on-the-job training and related classroom instruction.

Who is eligible: Programs are sponsored by employers, employer associations, or labor/management groups. Apprentices are hired/or trained directly by those organizations.

How it works: The Maine Apprenticeship program sets up a structured program based on the specific needs of the employer. The program can reimburse up to 50% of the apprentice's tuition for college credit courses while the worker is employed and also learning new skills on the job.

Maine Community Foundation

The Maine Community Foundation is a private foundation that provides information on a variety of scholarships available for people seeking post secondary education.

Who is eligible: Eligibility requirements vary by scholarship.

How it works: The foundation's website includes links to dozens of different scholarship programs and contact information for individuals interested in applying for each scholarship.

Opportunity Maine

Opportunity Maine is a new initiative that provides a tax credit for student loan payments after a student graduates from a Maine school.

Who is eligible: Graduates from Maine colleges with student loans originating after January 2008 who live and work in Maine are eligible. Businesses that pay a student's loan are also eligible for the tax credit.

How it works: Maine graduates fill out paperwork to claim a tax credit based on level of education attained and the amount of their student debt. The average tax credit will be \$2,100 each year, but the students with the highest debts will be able to claim up to \$5,500 each year.

Osher Scholarship

Provides grants to encourage Maine residents to start post secondary education at the University of Maine System or Maine Community College System.

Who is eligible: Eligibility varies depending on the campus.

Parents as Scholars

Parents as Scholars is a state sponsored program for parents involved in a two year or four year post secondary education program. It offers a monthly benefit based on the guidelines for the TANF program.

Who is eligible: Parents who are otherwise qualified for Temporary Aid to Needy Families (TANF) and are pursuing a two- or four-year degree.

How it works: Provides cash assistance in an amount equal to what the individual would have received through TANF.

Vocational Rehabilitation

Vocational Rehabilitation is a state-sponsored program that provides employment and training services for people with disabilities.

Who is eligible: People who have a disability that keeps them from getting or keeping a job.

How it works: The program works with people to develop a career plan and pays for education or equipment needed to help the person become employed.

Part 3: Achieving Education Goals

ACE Credit

The American Council on Education's College Credit Recommendation Service (CREDIT) connects workplace learning with colleges and universities by helping adults gain access to academic credit for formal courses and examinations taken outside traditional degree programs. If your organization offers courses designed to expand and improve the knowledge base and skill sets of your employees or members, then you should learn more about CREDIT. Participants in your programs may be able to earn college credit with successful completion of your courses. CREDIT has helped save millions of tuition-assisted dollars.

Who is eligible: Adult workers with applicable skills and experience.

How it works: Evaluators review courses and make recommendations on the amount of college credit that should be transferred to degree programs. Credit is awarded at the discretion of the college or university.

Prior Learning Assessment

Prior Learning Assessment provides college credit for skills and experience earned outside the classroom.

Who is eligible: Adult workers with applicable skills and experience.

How it works: Prior Learning Assessment is handled differently at each of Maine's colleges and universities. Policymakers are identifying state-level policies, practices and strategies to raise the overall level of prior learning assessment at public and private institutions of higher education in the state.
